one school and having a science/tech program at another building is not financially or educationally sound. Laboratory space and equipment would need to be duplicated in both buildings.

Two schools would require renovation to accommodate additional technology. Telephone lines (on-

line access) and electrical wiring would have to be added and/or re placed. The need to purchase many new computers and printers for both schools is unavoidable. Both schools would be in competition to premit the same competition to recruit the same student. Housing the already suc cessful gifted program in another building would leave Auburn at a great disadvantage. Auburn

would be left struggling to pro-mote a non-funded, unplanned theme. A science/tech program housed at Auburn will fail if it must compete with another school housing the Academy and CAPA programs. If we are relegated to be a science/tech theme.

gated to be a science recti uneme, a more efficient, fiscally appropriate plan would be to maintain the Academy and CAPA at Auburn.

Removing successful programs from Auburn and replacing them with a magnet theme which is with a magnet theme which is unrealistic and unattainable are not prudent actions. The title without the facility is meaning-less. A decision made without con-
